



### All about PIE

To **Persuade** means the author is trying to make you do something or think in a certain way.

To **Inform** means the author is telling you some facts.

To Entertain means the author wants to tell you a story that you will enjoy.



## Persudde 2 6

The author tries to get you to do something or believe what he is saying.

#### For Example...

"This pie is so delicious, you will want to go buy one right now!" "Pies are on sale today for £3.99 What a great price!"

#### Other Examples...













The author gives you information about a topic.

#### For Example...

"The average American eats six slices of pie each year." "Pie has been around since the ancient Egyptians."


